Dr. Yeshashwork Kibour is a licensed clinical psychologist currently working in the capacity of Associate Director of Clinical Training at Argosy University, Washington DC. She is also in private practice where she provides individual therapy, psychological evaluations, court accompaniment, and expert witness testimony for survivors of trauma including politically motivated torture, human

trafficking, and gender based violence. Dr. Kibour has worked with refugee and immigrant families for the past 10 years. Prior to coming to Argosy she was a program evaluator, therapist, and clinical director of the Program for Survivors of Torture and Severe Trauma (PSTT), a program of the Center for Multicultural Human Services (CMHS) in Falls Church, Virginia. She also served as an adjunct faculty at George Washington University's Psychology

Department. Dr. Kibour earned her Masters and Ph.D. degrees in Counseling and Clinical Psychology respectively, from Howard University in Washington DC. She received her post-doctoral training from the Center for Victims of Torture in Minneapolis, Minnesota. Dr. Kibour has presented her work at various national and international conferences. She has also published in the Journal of Cultural Diversity and Ethnic Minority Psychology.
